It is our hope that by sharing this list of skills, you can utilize your time over the summer to practice them to best prepare your child for success within our curriculum.

Students should be able to:

Reading	Math
Read 100 sight words. Fry Sight Word List, 1-100. A complete list is available upon request.	 Count forward from 1-100, and backward from 10-1.
 Read independently at Scholastic Level D. <i>A popular series in this level is</i> Biscuit <i>by Alyssa Satin</i> <i>Capucilli.</i> Recognize and say the sounds for Spalding phonograms 1-70, when shown each phonogram in isolation. <i>Resources for phonogram practice are available</i> <i>upon request.</i> 	 With the use of pictures, subtract two numbers where the highest number starts with 10. <i>Example: 10 - 8 = 2</i> With the use of pictures, add two numbers where the sum is 10. <i>Example: 8 + 2 = 10</i> Count pictures, write number symbols, and say number words through 20.
Writing	Basic Skills
Copy 3 sentences from the board with correct	> Hold pencil with <i>pincher</i> grip.
spelling, capitalization, and punctuation.	Cut with scissors and use glue.
Write 1 sentence independently on a given topic and be able to read and explain the sentence.	Tie own shoes, button, and fasten their own clothing.
Recognize, name, and write all 26 letters of the alphabet (upper case and lower case).	Work for 20 minutes independently from seated position.
Write their first and last name with proper spacing and capitalization.	 Communicate basic needs to others. (e.g., ask for help or clarification during learning
Write appropriately on lined paper of various	activities, ask to use the restroom when needed, etc.)
sizes. (e.g., fitting text within the space, writing letters on	Homework and Tests
the baseline, adding spaces between words, or showing clear distinction between tall letters and short letters)	 Complete 25 minutes of homework on average (one Spalding and one math assignment) as well as 20 minutes of leveled reading.

	Practice math facts.
